“Small but Mighty!”

**Hinesville Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.
Chapter President, Petula Y. Gomillion**



For almost 30 years, the Hinesville Alumnae Chapter has focused its efforts on impacting the chapter's service areas through Educational Development, Political Awareness, and Involvement as well as Physical and Mental Health. This year, however, the Chapter boarded U.S.S. Fortitude to travel the waterways on its mission to address all aspects of the Five-Point Programmatic Thrust using "Anchored in Delta- A Journey of a Lifetime" as the theme and backdrop for all of its activities.

The year began with the chapter hosting a Voter Education Forum and Registration Drive in Jesup, Georgia. Hinesville Alumnae partnered with the Wayne County Branch of the NAACP. The Guest Speaker, Rev. Dr. Francys Johnson, Georgia State NAACP President spoke on issues related to Voter Education including Voter Suppression and Voter Disenfranchisement, as well as other critical tactics used to discourage minorities from exercising their right to vote. The chapter also hosted a Voter Registration Drive at Liberty High School for students ages 17 and a half to 18 years of age in preparation for the November election. The students were educated on their voting rights and received a "I Registered to Vote" button on behalf of the chapter.

In October, the Program Planning and Development Committee in conjunction with Webster University hosted the first ever Teen Summit. The Teen Summit which targeted teens between the ages of 13-19, and focused its efforts on topics designed to assist teens in rising above their situations and circumstances.

Facilitators for the event brought experience from an array of careers speaking on topics such as; "Healthy Body/Self-Esteem, Healthy Relationships, Digital Citizenship and most importantly, Interacting with the Police." This particular topic raised several questions among the teens and their parents to the Facilitator, who serves as a Georgia State Trooper.

To overcome the numerous literacy barriers impacting the chapter's service area, members of the chapter took a page from Delta Sigma Theta's history and hosted a Book Drive. In conjunction with the Bryan County Family Connection, the chapter donated five boxes of new or gently used books. In exchange for books, the Bryan County News donated old newspaper boxes to the chapter. Shortly, the Old Newspaper Boxes will be strategically placed at locations in Bryan County (Pembroke & Richmond Hill) and include the numerous books donated by its members.

To promote a sound Mind, Body, and Spirit, members of the chapter, are participating in the "Journey to Wellness" which is a signature Physical and Mental Health "call to action" initiative. The Physical and Mental Health Committee has also participated in the Mental Health Across the Lifespan Initiative by hosting a Mental Health Forum each year during May Week. The forum draws attention to the Mental Health issues impacting our community.

To promote a healthy checkbook, the Economic Development Committee hosted the first ever Winter Warm-Up/ Sugar Plum Christmas party where children within the community received a Christmas party and the parents received a Financial Fortitude workshop. The workshop focused on providing the community members with the tools and resources needed to break the cycle of poverty and live debt-free.

Under the umbrella of International Awareness and Involvement, the chapter partnered with Socks for Courtney, which is a non-profit organization based in the chapter's service area (Richmond Hill, Georgia). Through Socks for Courtney, the chapter was able to reach over eight organizations, who provide socks to over 100,000 children and families around the world.

Finally, the Chapter completed its third year with the St. Jude's Children Research Hospital Virtual Run/Walk Drive. The chapter met and exceeded its goal for the past three years and raised over \$1700 for research to end childhood cancer. Also, chapter members collectively walked/ran over 100 miles during the actual day of the event.

The women portrayed three defining women of color immersed in STEM related careers advocating for the advancement of African American women.

The film tells the story of Katherine G. Johnson, Dorothy Vaughn, and Mary Jackson, three black female mathematicians who began working for NASA in the 50's and charted the launch of astronaut John Glenn into orbit during the Space Race from NASA's Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia during segregation.

Before computers, laptops, or desktops were in existence, these women who did the math by hand were known as "human computers".

The Arts and Letters Committee is so happy that Hinesville Alumnae Chapter supported this project. We had a sold out crowd of 224. It is our honor to support Black Artist in the movie industry.

Service is at the bedrock of everything we do in the sorority. At the heart of the community service mission are members of the sorority who ensure that conditions are set for a successful community both now and in the future. One such soror who stands at the helm of this movement within the Southern Region is Soror Daisy Jones.

Soror Daisy Jones is a member of the Hinesville Alumnae Chapter. She accepted the appointment of Georgia State Representative Al Williams in 2014 to lead the startup of a re-entry coalition and subsequent re-entry program in Liberty County. Soror Jones serves as the Executive Director of the Liberty County Prison Re-Entry Coalition, Inc. The Georgia Department of Community Supervision also selected her to serve as the Community Coordinator for the Atlantic Judicial Circuit in August 2016.


Liberty County, which is the county seat for Hinesville, Fort Stewart, Midway, Riceboro, Walthourville, and Fleming has a population of over 60,000 people with over 41% of those people being African-American. In Liberty County alone, the number of African-Americans incarcerated from 1970 until now has grown exponentially with most of the incarcerations being African-American men.

Therefore, to ensure that these citizens re-entering their communities are successful and educated on their rights and responsibilities, Soror Jones and her staff guide and empower returning citizens to maximize their potential and increase their opportunities for successful reintegration into society. Thereby decreasing recidivism and assisting clients to become productive citizens within their communities and most importantly stop the cycle of incarceration within the family.

Soror in the Spotlight Continued

According to National Statistics, there are over 1700 people a day who are released from state and federal prisons. From several perspectives, the issue of how people fare after they exit the prison gates is extremely important. As Michelle Alexander states in her book ***The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness***, “We could choose to be a nation that extends care, compassion, and concern to those who are locked up and locked out or headed for prison before they are old enough to vote. We could seek for them the same opportunities we seek for our own children; we could treat them like one of “us.” We could do that. Or we can choose to be a nation that shames and blames its most vulnerable, affixes badges of dishonor upon them at young ages, and then relegates them to a permanent second-class status for life.”

Soror Daisy Jones is doing her part to ensure returning citizens within the Liberty County area are successful. Because of her dedication and commitment to service, we celebrate her as our Soror in the Spotlight! Congratulations Soror Daisy Jones!


