Q&A with Soror Sarah P. Baker

What is a woman of Delta Sigma Theta?

A woman of Delta Sigma Theta carries herself with humility. She carries herself in such a way that others want to emulate her. When I became a Delta, over 46 years ago, I was inspired to join based on the positive Delta role models I had throughout my life. They were women of grace, intelligence, and integrity. Despite all their accomplishments, they never boasted or bragged about their success. They had a love for Christ and a heart for people [...]. I wanted to be just like them.

What is the true essence of sisterhood among college-educated women committed to scholarship and service?

The essence of Sisterhood is love. It is a lifetime commitment to showing and sharing Agape love to one another—even when we disagree. It means respecting a Soror's opinion even if it differs from your own. For us to get along and demonstrate true sisterhood, we must always respect each other. When we do this, we genuinely can be on one accord as we serve others.

With respect to the jewels Temperance, Honesty, Justice, and Compassion, how do you think these virtues have kept us (as Deltas) anchored in the social issues impacting our community on the national and local levels?

With respect to the jewels Temperance, Honesty, Justice, and Compassion, how do you think these virtues have kept us (as Deltas) anchored in the social issues impacting our community on the national and local levels?

From its founding, Delta Sigma Theta was focused on bettering the lives of other people. When I entered the Sorority, we were told that our job was to be selfless and to always look out for those who are less fortunate than ourselves. That was the focus. [...]. Giving to others who are in need is a biblical truth. [...]. God doesn't bless us for our benefit; we are blessed to be a blessing to some-one else. I think this core belief drives what the Sorority does on all levels. Whether we are donating to humanitarian efforts abroad, lobbying national leaders for fair legislation, or working with young people in our service areas, Deltas promote and support causes that benefit society. We can only do this if we truly believe not just in Temperance, Honesty, Justice and Compassion, but we demonstrate all the virtues on which our Sorority is built.

After thirty years in Hinesville Alumnae Chapter, what do you think is essential for the chapter to continue to thrive?

I think we must always make sure that we are *seen* doing public service. The chapter *must* be seen being involved. [...]. We cannot do this work as a single entity. We must work with others who are invested in the same common goals we hold dear. Making financial contributions [to different public service efforts] is fine, but I want to see us putting the funds we raise to work.

Looking forward, how can Hinesville Alumnae evolve and meet the needs of its service areas?

We do the same things for the same people all the time. We need to dig a little deeper and see where there is truly a need. I think our involvement in Autism Awareness is a great start. There are so many families that are impacted by [this condition] and many of them do not know how to best help their children. [...]. In addition to raising money [for Autism Awareness], this may mean that we go into schools, talk to administrators, and see how we can help [students and parents] more directly. This is especially true for [our] African American children. We need to take the advice Soror [Cynthia M. A.] Butler-McIntyre gave at our 30th Anniversary Celebration and become agents and advocates for causes that may take us out of our comfort zones.

Based on your experience in our Sorority, what would be your most genuine advice to Delta Dolls, Delta Divas, and Delta Dears?

Delta Dears, don't forget where we came from. Let's not forget the things that brought us over. Yes, the times have changed, but we are the same people and we must teach what we learned to the younger Sorors. To Delta Dolls and Divas, make sure that whatever you do in the name of Delta helps and lifts someone else. Make sure your intentions are pure.

Soror Sarah P. Baker was initiated into Delta Sigma Theta at Bradley University in Spring 1971. She is a charter member and past chapter president of Hinesville Alumnae

Anchored in Delta: A Journey of a Lifetime A Historical Sketch of Hinesville Alumnae Chapter 1987-2017

The Hinesville Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. was chartered on May 24, 1987, at Midway Congregational Church, in Midway, Georgia. Dr. Louise A. Rice, past Southern Regional Director and our 23rd National President officiated. Soror Beautine Hardwick of Savannah Alumnae Chapter assisted in the ceremony.

National Headquarters issued the clarion call to help bring awareness back to historical black colleges and universities. What better way to bring awareness than to make a campus visit. A college visit is the first opportunity for students to get a first hand view of a college. A key part of deciding which college to go to is finding a good fit. Moreover, a great way to get more information is to visit the college in person. Lastly, educational development is a component of the sorority's Five-Point Programmatic Thrust.

Many of the Delta GEMS committee members and other chapter members are alumnus of a historical black college or university. And we want our youth program participants to understand that black colleges and universities are ideal for a quality and affordable education. Lastly, we want participants to hear how other college students from low-income families have found an array of opportunities to pursue their interests and passions in the best tradition of a black college or university with the resources of a national research institution.

We provide programs and services that contribute to participants' total development. Many of the participant's parents want help in guiding their child/children to future success. Over the last three-sororial years, we have taken seventy-plus students on college visits. Because of our willingness to sponsor the annual college tour, many first generation children have followed through with their dream of attending college. Both participants and community partners program participants have since gone on to enroll at some of the following schools that visited: Albany State, Bethune-Cookman University, North Carolina Agricultural and Technical University, Tennessee State University, Tuskegee University, Tennessee State, and Spelman College.

Currently, we have several community partners the Hinesville Housing Authority, Iota Phi Theta Fraternity and teachers that provide sponsorship to support our college tour. Lastly, both students and parents consider Hinesville Alumnae Chapter as an additional support system for answering questions and providing information about college preparations. We have learned that college tours are a service and the ideal way to promote awareness.
